### **A Message from Mrs. Laframboise**


Dear Parents, Caregivers and Students,

It has been a blessed year here at Notre Dame. Our Catholic School Community Council, staff, students, volunteers, parents, and caregivers have all actively participated in making this a vibrant school community nurturing the intellectual, spiritual, physical, and emotional development and well-being of our students. I have been grateful to have been a part of it this year and I look forward to another great year at Notre Dame next year.

If you are planning on driving around with your family this summer, here are a few activities to promote numeracy and to pass the time in the car... especially if you decide to have some "unplugged time":

#### **Math on the road:**

- When you are travelling in a car or sitting on a bench, take turns with your child calling out licence plate numbers (driver excluded for safety reasons).
- Have your child record the licence plate numbers.
- Make the largest three-digit number possible from the plate numbers.
- Ask younger children to name the largest single-digit number and the smallest single-digit number and to call out the numbers in order from smallest to largest. Some children may just name each number.
- Compare the value of a licence plate number with the value of another licence plate number. Is the second number greater than or less than the first number?
- Find the sum of the numbers in a licence plate.
  - Ask children to find ways to make a target number between 1 and 20 (depending on ability and the requirements of the curriculum expectations) with any of the numbers in a licence plate, using addition and/or subtraction.
  - Ask young children to double each digit in the licence plate number.
  - Have older children choose any number as a factor. Every time they see their number, they multiply it. For example, if they choose 6 and spot a number 6 on a licence plate, they multiply the two 6's and get 36. The next time they see 6, they multiply 36 x 6 and get a new answer of 216. They continue until you reach your destination. You may want to keep a calculator in the car. As a treat, have someone open the car door for the person who scores the highest number.
- The next time you fill up your car with gas, let your child read the different numbers on the pump. Ask him or her to estimate the distance between where you are and where you are going. Have your child estimate how much gas will be needed to travel that distance.

## DRESS CODE

With the warmer weather upon us, we would like to remind all parents/guardians/students to adhere to the school dress code.

Some simple guidelines to follow are:

- Slogans or images on t-shirts, hats or any other accessories must not take away from the dignity of any individual or conflict with Christian values. Images portraying alcohol, sexual connotations, racism and violence are not acceptable.
- Strapless or revealing tops are not permitted. Students **in all grades** may not wear tops with spaghetti straps. Shoulder straps must be at **least two fingers in width**.
- Shorts, skirts, skorts and dresses must be no shorter than mid-thigh.
- Clothing must cover the midriff, i.e., Tops and bottoms must overlap at all times—sitting, standing, moving bending, etc.
- Net, sheer or muscle shirts are not allowed.
- Hats, toques, hoods and sunglasses must be removed upon entry into the building or classroom.
